Monthly Coffee Mornings







Five-ingredient flourless Brownies to make during the lockdown

With everyone staying indoors, many of us have turned our hands to baking. But with flour now seemingly a thing of the past, we're having to find alternatives.

So allow us to present to you a simple recipe for delicious chocolate brownies that are ready to go in the oven in just five minutes, baking to a fudgy, crackly-topped brownie perfection in just half an hour.

Prep time: 5 minutes Cook time: 30 minutes Serves: 9

Ingredients

- ½ cup (1 stick) unsalted butter
- 1 cup chocolate chips (semi-sweet or dark)
- ½ cup granulated sugar
- 3 large eggs
- ¼ cup unsweetened cocoa powder

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350°F/176 C.
 Lightly grease an 8x8-inch baking

- dish or pan with non-stick cooking
- spray and set aside.
- Place the butter and chocolate chips in a large microwave-safe bowl.
- Heat in the microwave for about two minutes, stirring every 30 seconds, until the chocolate chips
- are melted and smooth.
- Remove from microwave. Whisk in the sugar then the eggs one at a time until batter is smooth.
- Add the cocoa powder and stir until well incorporated.
- Spread the batter evenly into the prepared baking dish.
- Bake for 25-30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out clean.
- Let cool completely in pan.
- Enjoy!

GREAT STAUGHTON HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY



his has been the strangest Spring in my memory but one of the most beautiful. Perhaps because there's been little else to focus on I've been bewitched by the gradual emergence of leaves and flowers in the glorious weather we've had since the rain stopped. It's got to the point now that rain is definitely needed. Soil is baking hard and if you missed getting those weeds out you're going to have a difficult job.

We're so lucky in our area to have plenty of walks within easy reach and I've been alternating between two or three. When you repeat the same walk regularly you notice every small change. I saw my first cowslip about the 1st of April, the first few bluebells coincided with the unfurling of horse chestnut leaves on 4th April. Great excitement early on 7th April when three hares gamboled across my path.

The birds have been at full volume - yellow hammers and sky larks particularly - and I've seen lots of goldfinches darting about - usually in pairs. Probably it is the lack of traffic that makes them seem so much louder but I have no

complaints at all.

Evidence of the tussle for life is there to see in a couple of scatterings of pigeon feathers. Would a fox do that? I doubt if we have peregrine falcons around here. I found a severed leg with grey fur on it. I hope it was a squirrel rather than a hare. A broken egg on the verge - small and blue and a dead baby bird on my driveway - one of the jackdaws that are nesting under the solar panels.

One thing that has been really striking is the speed at which the crops are growing. For days the fields are brown, then overnight a green fuzz of baby shoots appears and it seems to take such a short time for them to mature and fill out. Respect to the farmers who keep everything in such good order around here.

Having procrastinated as usual, I finally sowed some Cosmos seeds the other day and was amazed how fast they germinated - at least the fresh seeds did. I planted a seed tray half with new seed and half with two year old seed. That was an interesting lesson. The older seed still hasn't come through.

Now that we're all at home it's difficult to make excuses for

missing gardening opportunities. Parts of my garden have been weeded for the first time ever. I've probably got rid of some of the lovely poppies that self seed most years!

Incidentally if you have any curiosity about the mystery of my chewed bark (referred to in a previous article) I've decided that the culprit must have been a squirrel. The hole that seemed to have appeared was simply the collapse of an old tree stump and while I was clearing the patch I found a suspicious horse chestnut. There are no chestnut trees anywhere near my garden so something must have imported it. Got to be a squirrel.

The allotments have been busy, as they normally are at this time of year but everything is looking extra spick and span. Sadly we seem to have attracted a badger on to the plot to join the rabbits, pheasants and mice so fortifications are needed around every precious crop. Luckily rhubarb doesn't seem to be vulnerable.

It's strange not being able to look forward to next month with any certainty. I have a feeling that normality will be a long time coming.

An update from the Chair of Great Staughton Parish Council

am writing this in mid April to meet the Life magazine deadline and you will be reading it in late April or early in May. We know how quickly things change and so if any of this seems out of date that is the reason.

I hope everyone reading this is well. Great Staughton is blessed with a wonderful community spirit and this has shown itself at this time. I would like to pay my tribute to all those who have taken time to volunteer to help others. I know from personal experience the community groups are so useful and helpful. Cathy and I have been self-isolating for a while and we have been very grateful for people getting us our medication and shopping. I would also like to thank local businesses which have adapted to try to ensure everyone is helped.

The residents of Great Staughton have shown their appreciation every Thursday to all the essential workers. We pay special tribute to our magnificent health and social care workers, but also to other essential workers across many sectors. A continued service from retail, distribution, all the utilities and waste collection services is vital for our wellbeing. I know our Parish is very grateful. We would normally have had our Parish Assembly in late April early May, but this year it has had to be postponed. This is a great shame as I particularly wanted to say thank you to John Harrison who retired at the end of March. John has

been looking after the verges and surrounding areas along the Green and Highway for over 25 years. I am sure I speak on behalf of everyone when I say what wonderful job you have done John and the whole village thanks you. We are pleased to welcome Phil Yates to the role, he has a hard act to follow.

I also would have paid tribute to a Parish Councillor who has recently resigned after about 20 years. Janet Bowen has been a very able, thoughtful, and conscientious Councillor. She has served in many roles on the council being a real advocate for the preschool, charities, and Friendship club. She has served for many years on the playing field committee and more recently on the community land trust. This will be another very hard act to follow and we thank you deeply. The Parish Council is pleased to welcome James Duberly to the Council as a co-optee.

I would also have updated residents at the Assembly on a number of matters, but I will mention a few of the most important here.

• The affordable housing project on Charities field on The Green is moving forward. Heads of Agreement outlining the agreed terms have been signed by all parties and it is hoped that a planning application will be submitted soon. The current emergency has made things more difficult and introduced a level of uncertainty but it is hoped that Chorus will be able to proceed. Whenever we hold an assembly it is intended we can show a video depicting a model of the 12

dwellings which are to be built on the field.

- The proposed change of speed limit through The Town has been accepted as a valid scheme to receive part funding from the County Council Highways. The Parish Council will be required to contribute but this is good news for safety on the road through the Town. Incorporated in the scheme will be speed reminder signs throughout the village. No timescale has been agreed at the moment but we have agreement to work up a scheme with the County Council.
- At last years Parish Assembly we heard about the possible Parish wide heating scheme being developed for Swaffham Prior. I am pleased to say Helen Glanville has progressed this and it is agreed we can make an application for the first tranche of funding to assess the feasibility of a scheme.

I am sure there are many other issues you would have wanted to raise and on which the Parish Council would have wanted to provide information. I hope that we can hold a Parish Assembly at an appropriate time when all issues can be discussed.

In the meantime I sincerely hope everyone stays well, stays safe, and follows Government advice.



A book about Staughton May 2020

'Comrades of the Great War'

Following the end of the war there were many public ceremonies of remembrance for the fallen and gratitude for their sacrifice in every part of the country; in Great Staughton a Roll of Honour commemorating the 94 villagers who had served in the conflict was placed in the church and a new tenor bell was commissioned and installed in the west tower. On 19 November 1919, a year after the signing of the Armistice, a public meeting was held in Great Staughton at which a proposal was put forward that a branch of the 'Comrades of the Great War' club should be established in Great Staughton. The purpose of the club was to provide activities such as billiards, snooker, darts and card games and to organise concerts, dances and flower shows which would enrich the everyday lives of villagers who had endured four years of hardship and loss. Harry Day, the cycle agent, proposed Captain Evelyn Hugh James Duberly, who had served with distinction in the war as a machine-gun officer in the Grenadier Guards, for the position of chairman. It was a position he was to occupy on and off for the next thirty-two years until his death in 1951. The committee of the club consisted of men whose names would feature in the life of the village for the next 40 years. Samuel Bruce proposed L Hollis for Honorary Secretary. Other members of the committee were Arthur Mehew,

landlord of the Robin Hood and Little John pub, which also became the temporary headquarters of the new club. Other committee members were H Standen, C Hackett, J Leflay and A Brewitt (one of the two butchers in the village. The other was Reginald Willmer who was shortly to join the committee). In June of that year, the master of the village school, Charles W Pearson joined the committee alongside Frank W Lack, who ran the grocer's shop and the Post Office. Mr Lack was to be a prominent contributor to village life over a period of forty years; he was a churchwarden, member of the Parochial Church Council, he served as a Parish Councillor and was instrumental in the formation of a branch of the Mothers' Union in the village. The committee was strengthened by the presence of the Rev. John Watford Wragg, since 1917 the vicar of St Andrew's church. Another new member was JC Barnard, a miller and baker. He also played a prominent role in village activities for several decades. He built Avery Cottage in Cage Lane. The club was thriving and enjoyed an enthusiastic membership of around thirty people.

An important change occurred in the organisation of the club in 1923 when, on 26 February of that year, a general meeting was held to change the name of the Comrades of the Great War club and to replace it with the Great Staughton Parish Social Club. The new club would have the same objectives as the Comrades and would be run by largely the same committee members.

One of the stipulations of the new club was that five of the elected committee should be ex-servicemen. The club was open to anyone over the age of sixteen and ran every night except Sunday from 6pm until 10pm. Captain Duberly was elected president of the club. Mr Lack was elected Vicechairman. Subscription was 2d per week, and for the use of the billiard table a charge of 3d per hour was levied. The club was open to all persons over the age of sixteen. Mr Reginald Willmer joined the committee in 1924and was quick to make a valuable contribution to the club's entertainment. The meeting of 12 March 1925 recorded the committee's gratitude to Mr R Willmer who offered to provide a wireless concert to be held in the village hall on Monday 6 April 1925. This must have been a very real novelty. Mrs Enid Saffron Duberly generously offered to provide a number of books for the club in order that a library could be established. Rev. Wragg swelled the library with a donation of thirty books. It wasn't the only donation of reading matter that vear; Mrs I Pearson donated eight annual volumes of the Illustrated London *News* to the library.

We have just celebrated Easter, the season of hope in the Christian calendar and although we were disappointed not to be in church, over 100 of us gathered on Easter Day via Zoom to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. Every day, except for Sundays, we have Morning prayer at 8.30am and Evening prayer at 5.30pm, there is a service on Sunday at 10.30am and meditation at 7.00pm on Tuesdays. On Wednesday at 2.00pm we have a study group which you are welcome to join.
